# 1.1 Before you proceed


Take note of the following precautions before you install motherboard components or change any motherboard settings.



- Unplug the power cord from the wall socket before touching any component.
- Use a grounded wrist strap or touch a safely grounded object or a metal object, such as the power supply case, before handling components to avoid damaging them due to static electricity
- · Hold components by the edges to avoid touching the ICs on them.
- Whenever you uninstall any component, place it on a grounded antistatic pad or in the bag that came with the component.
- Before you install or remove any component, ensure that the ATX power supply is switched off or the power cord is detached from the power supply. Failure to do so may cause severe damage to the motherboard, peripherals, or components.

# **Onboard LED**

This motherboard comes with a standby power LED that lights up to indicate that the system is ON, in sleep mode, or in soft-off mode. This is a reminder that you must shut down the system and unplug the power cable before removing or plugging in any motherboard component. The illustration below shows the location of the onboard LED.





# 1.2.1 Motherboard layout



Ensure that you install the motherboard into the chassis in the correct orientation. The edge with external ports goes to the rear part of the chassis.





Place six screws into the holes indicated by circles to secure the motherboard to the chassis. **DO NOT** overtighten the screws! Doing so can damage the motherboard.

# 1.3 Central Processing Unit (CPU)

This motherboard comes with a 940-pin AMD<sup>®</sup> Socket AM2+ / AM2 for AMD Phenom<sup>™</sup> II / Phenom<sup>™</sup> / Athlon<sup>™</sup> FX / Athlon<sup>™</sup> 64 / Sempron<sup>™</sup> processor.


The AM2/AM2+ socket has a different pinout from the 940-pin socket designed for the AMD Opteron<sup>™</sup> processor. Ensure that you use a CPU that is designed for the AM2/AM2+ socket. The CPU fits in only one correct orientation. **DO NOT** force the CPU into the socket to prevent bending the pins and damaging the CPU!

# 1.4 System memory

# 1.4.1 Overview

This motherboard comes with two Double Data Rate 2 (DDR2) Dual Inline Memory Modules (DIMM) sockets. A DDR2 DIMM has the same physical dimensions as a DDR DIMM but has a 240-pin footprint compared to the 184-pin DDR DIMM. DDR2 DIMMs are notched differently to prevent installation on a DDR DIMM socket.

The figure illustrates the location of the DDR2 DIMM sockets:

# 1.4.2 Memory configurations

You may install 512MB, 1GB, and 2GB unbuffered ECC/non-ECC DDR2 DIMMs into the DIMM sockets.



- You may install varying memory sizes in Channel A and Channel B. The system maps the total size of the lower-sized channel for the dual-channel configuration. Any excess memory from the higher-sized channel is then mapped for the single-channel operation.
- Always install DIMMs with the same CAS latency. For optimum compatibility, we recommend that you obtain memory modules from the same vendor.
- Due to the memory address limitation on the 32-bit Windows® OS, when you install 4GB or more memory on the motherboard, the actual usable memory for the OS can be about 3GB or less. For effective use of memory, we recommend that you install a 64-bit Windows® OS when 4GB or more memory is installed on the motherboard.
- This motherboard does not support DIMMs made up of 256 megabits (Mb) or less.



- The default memory operation frequency depends on its SPD. Under the default state, some memory modules for overclocking may operate at a lower frequency than the vendor-marked value.
- For system stability, use a more efficient cooling system to support a full memory load (2 DIMMs) or overclocking conditions.

 The default DIMM frequency depends on its Serial Presence Detect (SPD), which is the standard way of accessing information from a memory module. Under the default state, some memory modules for overclocking may operate at a lower frequency than the vendor-marked value.



#### SS - Single-sided / DS - Double - sided DIMM support:

- A\*: Supports one module inserted into either slot as the single-channel memory configuration.
- B\*: Supports one pair of modules inserted into both the yellow slots as one pair of dual-channel memory configuration.

# 1.5 Expansion slots

In the future, you may need to install expansion cards. The following sub-sections describe the slots and the expansion cards that they support.



Ensure to unplug the power cord before adding or removing expansion cards. Failure to do so may cause you physical injury and damage motherboard components.

# 1.5.1 Installing an expansion card

To install an expansion card:

- 1. Before installing the expansion card, read the documentation that comes with it and make the necessary hardware settings for the card.
- 2. Remove the chassis cover (if your motherboard is already installed in a chassis).
- 3. Remove the bracket opposite the slot that you intend to use.
- Align the card connector with the slot and press firmly until the card is completely seated on the slot.
- 5. Secure the card to the chassis with the screw.
- 6. Replace the chassis cover.

# 1.5.2 Configuring an expansion card

After installing the expansion card, configure it by adjusting the software settings.

- 1. Turn on the system and change the necessary BIOS settings, if any. See Chapter 2 for information on BIOS setup.
- 2. Assign an IRQ to the card.
- 3. Install the software drivers for the expansion card.



When using PCI cards on shared slots, ensure that the drivers support "Share IRQ" or that the cards do not need IRQ assignments; otherwise, conflicts will arise between the two PCI groups, making the system unstable and the card inoperable.

# 1.5.3 PCI slot

The PCI slots support cards such as LAN cards, SCSI cards, USB cards, and other cards that comply with the PCI specifications.

# 1.5.4 PCI Express x1 slot

This motherboard supports PCI Express x1 network cards, SCSI cards, and other cards that comply with the PCI Express specifications.

# 1.5.5 PCI Express x16 slot

This motherboard supports PCI Express x16 graphics cards that comply with the PCI Express specifications.

# 1.6 Jumpers

# 1. Clear RTC RAM (3-pin CLRTC)

This jumper allows you to clear the Real Time Clock (RTC) RAM in CMOS. You can clear the CMOS memory of date, time, and system setup parameters by erasing the CMOS RTC RAM data. The onboard button cell battery powers the RAM data in CMOS, which include system setup information such as system passwords. To erase the RTC RAM:

1. Turn OFF the computer and unplug the power cord.


- 2. Move the jumper cap from pins 1-2 (default) to pins 2-3. Keep the cap on pins 2-3 for about 5-10 seconds, then move the cap back to pins 1-2.
- 3. Plug the power cord and turn ON the computer.
- Hold down the <Del> key during the boot process and enter BIOS setup to re-enter data.



Except when clearing the RTC RAM, never remove the cap on CLRTC jumper default position. Removing the cap will cause system boot failure!




- If the steps above do not help, remove the onboard battery and move the jumper again to clear the CMOS RTC RAM data. After clearing the CMOS, reinstall the battery.
- You do not need to clear the RTC when the system hangs due to overclocking. For system failure due to overclocking, use the CPU Parameter Recall (C.P.R.) feature. Shut down and reboot the system, then the BIOS automatically resets parameter settings to default values.



## M2N68-AM PLUS Clear RTC RAM


#### 2. USB device wake-up (3-pin USBPW5-10)

Set these jumpers to +5V to wake up the computer from S1 sleep mode (CPU stopped, DRAM refreshed, system running in low power mode) using the connected USB devices. Set to +5VSB to wake up from S3 and S4 sleep modes (no power to CPU, DRAM in slow refresh, power supply in reduced power mode). The USBPW5-10 jumper is for the internal USB connectors that you can connect to additional USB ports.



#### 3. Keyboard/mouse power (3-pin KBPW)


This jumper allows you to enable or disable the keyboard/mouse and USB port 1-4 wake-up feature. When you set this jumper to pins 2-3 (+5VSB), you can wake up the computer by pressing a key on the keyboard (the default is the Space Bar), clicking the mouse, or using a USB device. This feature requires an ATX power supply that can supply at least 1A on the +5VSB lead, and a corresponding setting in the BIOS. The PS2\_USBPW1-4 jumper is for the rear USB ports.




M2N68-AM PLUS Keyboard Power Setting

# 1.7 Connectors

# 1.7.1 Rear panel ports



- 1. PS/2 Mouse port. This port is for a PS/2 mouse.
- 2. Parallel port. This 25-pin port connects a parallel printer, a scanner, or other devices.
- 3. LAN (RJ-45) port. This port allows 10/100 PHY connection to a Local Area Network (LAN) through a network hub.



- Line In port (light blue). This port connects to the tape, CD, DVD player, or other audio sources.
- 5. Line Out port (lime). This port connects to a headphone or a speaker. In 4-channel and 6-channel configuration, the function of this port becomes Front Speaker Out.
- 6. Microphone port (pink). This port connects to a microphone.



Refer to the audio configuration table below for the function of the audio ports in 2, 4, or 6-channel configuration.



- 7. USB 2.0 ports 1 and 2. These two 4-pin Universal Serial Bus (USB) ports connect to USB 2.0 devices.
- 8. USB 2.0 ports 3 and 4. These two 4-pin Universal Serial Bus (USB) ports connect to USB 2.0 devices.
- 9. Video Graphics Adapter (VGA) port. This 15-pin port is for a VGA monitor or other VGA-compatible devices.
- 10. COM port. This 9-pin COM1 port is for pointing devices or other serial devices.
- 11. PS/2 Keyboard port. This port is for a PS/2 keyboard.

# 1.7.2 Internal connectors

#### 1. Serial ATA connectors (7-pin SATA1, SATA2, SATA3, and SATA4)

These connectors are for the Serial ATA signal cables for Serial ATA 3Gb/s hard disk and optical disk drives. The Serial ATA 3Gb/s is backward compatible with Serial ATA 1.5Gb/s specification. The data transfer rate of the Serial ATA 3Gb/s is faster than the standard parallel ATA with 133MB/s (Ultra DMA133).



#### 2. IDE connector (40-1 pin PRI IDE)


The onboard IDE connector is for an Ultra DMA 133/100/66 signal cable. There are three connectors on each Ultra DMA 133 / 100 / 66 signal cable: blue, black, and gray. Connect the blue connector to the motherboard's IDE connector, then select one of the following modes to configure your devices.

Pin 20 on the IDE connector is removed to match the covered hole on the Ultra DMA cable connector. This prevents incorrect insertion when you connect the IDE cable.


- If any device jumper is set as "Cable-Select", ensure that all other device jumpers have the same setting.
- Use the 80-conductor IDE cable for Ultra DMA 133/100/66 IDE devices.

#### 3. Optical drive audio in connector (4-pin CD)


This connector allows you to receive stereo audio input from sound sources such as a CD-ROM, TV tuner, or MPEG card.

#### 4. USB connectors (10-1 pin USB56, USB78, USB910)

These connectors are for USB 2.0 ports. Connect the USB module cable to any of these connectors, then install the module to a slot opening at the back of the system chassis. These USB connectors comply with the USB 2.0 specification that supports up to 480Mbps connection speed.

Never connect a 1394 cable to the USB connectors. Doing so will damage the motherboard!





# 5. CPU fan connector (4-pin CPU\_FAN)

The CPU fan connector supports cooling fans of 350mA~740mA (8.88W max.) or a total of 1A~2.22A (26.64W max.) at +12V. Connect the CPU fan cable to the CPU fan connector on the motherboard, ensuring that the black wire of each cable matches the ground pin of the connector.




**DO NOT** forget to connect the CPU fan cable to the CPU fan connector. Insufficient air flow inside the system may damage the motherboard components. It is not a jumper! **DO NOT** place a jumper cap on the CPU fan connector.



#### 6. ATX power connectors (24-pin EATXPWR, 4-pin ATX12V)

These connectors are for an ATX power supply. The plugs from the power supply are designed to fit these connectors in only one orientation. Find the proper orientation and push down firmly until the connectors completely fit.




M2N68-AM PLUS ATX power connectors

- We recommend that you use an ATX 12V Specification 2.0-compliant power supply unit (PSU) with a minimum of 300W power rating. This PSU type has 24-pin and 4-pin power plugs.
- If you intend to use a PSU with 20-pin and 4-pin power plugs, make sure that the 20-pin power plug can provide at least 15 A on +12 V and that the PSU has a minimum power rating of 300 W. The system may become unstable or may not boot up if the power is inadequate.
- DO NOT forget to connect the 4-pin ATX +12 V power plug; otherwise, the system will not boot up.
- We recommend that you use a PSU with higher power output when configuring a system with more power-consuming devices. The system may become unstable or may not boot up if the power is inadequate.
- If you are uncertain about the minimum power supply requirement for your system, refer to the Recommended Power Supply Wattage Calculator at <u>http://support.asus. com/PowerSupplyCalculator/PSCalculator.aspx?SLanguage=en-us</u> for details.
- You must install a PSU with a higher power rating if you intend to install additional devices.

#### 7. Speaker connector (4- pin SPEAKER)


This 4-pin connector is for the chassis-mounted system warning speaker. The speaker allows you to hear system beeps and warnings.

## System power LED (2-pin PWRLED)

This 2-pin connector is for the system power LED. Connect the chassis power LED cable to this connector. The system power LED lights up when you turn on the system power, and blinks when the system is in sleep mode.

## Hard disk drive activity LED (2-pin HDLED)

This 2-pin connector is for the HDD Activity LED. Connect the HDD Activity LED cable to this connector. The IDE LED lights up or flashes when data is read from or written to the HDD.

#### Power/Soft-off button (2-pin PWRBTN)


This 2-pin connector is for the system power button. Pressing the power button turns the system ON or puts the system in SLEEP or SOFT-OFF mode depending on the BIOS settings. Pressing the power switch for more than four seconds while the system is ON turns the system OFF.

#### Reset button (2-pin RESET)

This 2-pin connector is for the chassis-mounted reset button for system reboot without turning off the system power.

## 9. Front panel audio connector (10-1 pin AAFP)

This connector is for a chassis-mounted front panel audio I/O module that supports either High Definition Audio or AC`97 audio standard. Connect one end of the front panel audio I/O module cable to this connector.




M2N68-AM PLUS Analog front panel connector

If you want to connect a high-definition front panel audio module to this connector, ensure that the **Front Panel Select** item in the BIOS is set to **[HD Audio**]. If you want to connect an AC97 front panel audio module to this connector, set the item to **[AC97]**. See page 2-9 for details.

#### 10. Digital audio connector (4-1 pin SPDIF\_OUT)

This connector is for an additional Sony/Philips Digital Interface (S/PDIF) port. Connect the S/PDIF Out module cable to this connector, then install the module to a slot opening at the back of the system chassis.





# Chapter 2 BIOS information

# 2.1 Managing and updating your BIOS

Save a copy of the original motherboard BIOS file to a bootable USB flash disk in case you need to restore the BIOS in the future. Copy the original motherboard BIOS using the ASUS Update utility..

# 2.1.1 ASUS Update utility

The ASUS Update is a utility that allows you to manage, save, and update the motherboard BIOS in Windows® environment.



- ASUS Update requires an Internet connection either through a network or an Internet Service Provider (ISP).
- This utility is available in the Support DVD that comes with the motherboard package.

#### Installing ASUS Update:

- 1. Place the Support DVD into the optical drive. The Drivers menu appears.
- 2. Click the Utilities tab, then click Install ASUS Update.
- 3. Follow the onscreen instructions to complete the installation.



Quit all Windows® applications before you update the BIOS using this utility.

## Updating the BIOS:

To update the BIOS:

- 1. From the Windows<sup>®</sup> desktop, Click Start > Programs > ASUS > ASUS Update > ASUS Update to launch the ASUS Update utility.
- 2. From the dropdown list, select either of the following methods:

Updating from the Internet

- a. Select Update BIOS from the Internet, then click Next.
- b. Select the ASUS FTP site nearest you to avoid network traffic, or click **Auto Select** then click **Next**.
- c. From the FTP site, select the BIOS version you want to download then click Next.



The ASUS Update utility is capable of updating itself through the Internet. Always update the utility to avail all its features.

# 2.1.2 ASUS EZ Flash 2 utility


The ASUS EZ Flash 2 feature allows you to update the BIOS without having to go through the long process of booting from a USB flash disk and using a DOS-based utility.

To update the BIOS using EZ Flash 2:

- 1. Insert the USB flash disk that contains the latest BIOS file to a USB port, then launch EZ Flash 2. You can launch EZ Flash 2 in two ways.

b. Enter the BIOS setup program. Go to Tools > EZ Flash 2 then press <Enter>.

2. Press <Tab> to locate the correct file. Press <Enter>.

When the correct BIOS file is found, EZ Flash 2 performs the BIOS update process and automatically reboots the system when done.

- This function supports USB flash disks with FAT 32/16 format and single partition only.
- DO NOT shut down or reset the system while updating the BIOS to prevent system boot failure!

# 2.1.3 ASUS CrashFree BIOS 3 utility

The ASUS CrashFree BIOS 3 is an auto recovery tool that allows you to restore the BIOS file when it fails or gets corrupted during the updating process. You can update a corrupted BIOS file using the motherboard Support DVD or a USB flash disk that contains the updated BIOS file.



- Prepare the motherboard Support DVD or a USB flash disk containing the updated motherboard BIOS before using this utility.
- Always connect the SATA cable to the SATA1/2 connector; otherwise, the utility will not function.

# **Recovering the BIOS**

To recover the BIOS:

- 1. Turn on the system.
- Insert the Support DVD or USB flash disk containing the BIOS file to the optical disk drive or a USB port.

The utility displays the following message and automatically checks the Support DVD or the USB flash disk for the BIOS file.

3. Restart the system after the utility completes the updating process.



- Only the USB flash disk with FAT 32/16 format and single partition supports ASUS CrashFree BIOS 3. The device size should be smaller than 8GB.
- DO NOT shut down or reset the system while updating the BIOS! Doing so can cause system boot failure!



The recovered BIOS may not be the latest BIOS version for this motherboard. Download the latest BIOS file from the ASUS website at <u>www.asus.com</u>.

# 2.2 BIOS setup program

Use the BIOS Setup program when you are installing a motherboard, reconfiguring your system, or prompted to "Run Setup." This section explains how to configure your system using this utility.

If you want to enter Setup after POST, reboot the system by doing any of the following procedures:

- · Restart using the OS standard shut-down procedure.
- Press <Ctrl>+<Alt>+<Del> simultaneously.
- Press the reset button on the system chassis.
- · Press the power button to turn the system off then back on.



Using the **power button**, **reset button**, or the **<Ctrl>+<Alt>+<Del>** keys to force reset from a running operating system can cause damage to your data or system. We recommend that you always shut down the system properly from the operating system.



- The default BIOS settings for this motherboard apply to most conditions to ensure optimum performance. If the system becomes unstable after changing any BIOS settings, load the default settings to ensure system compatibility and stability. Select the Load Setup Defaults item under the Exit menu. See section 2.8 Exit menu.
- The BIOS setup screens in this section are for reference only. They may not exactly
  match what you see on your screen.

# 2.3.4 Primary IDE Master/Slave and SATA 1~4

While entering Setup, the BIOS automatically detects the presence of IDE/SATA devices. There is a separate submenu for each IDE/SATA device. Select a device item then press **<Enter>** to display the IDE/SATA device information.

The BIOS automatically detects the values opposite the dimmed items (Device, Vendor, Size, LBA Mode, Block Mode, PIO Mode, Async DMA, Ultra DMA, and SMART monitoring). These values are not user-configurable. These items show **Not Detected** if no IDE/SATA device is installed in the system.

# Type [Auto]

Selects the type of IDE drive. Setting to **[Auto]** allows automatic selection of the appropriate IDE device type. Select **[CDROM]** if you are specifically configuring a CD-ROM drive. Select **[ARMD]** (ATAPI Removable Media Device) if your device is either a ZIP, LS-120, or MO drive.



This item does not appear when you select the SATA 1/2/3/4 devices.

# LBA/Large Mode [Auto]

Enables or disables the LBA mode. Setting to **[Auto]** enables the LBA mode if the device supports this mode, and if the device was not previously formatted with LBA mode disabled. Configuration options: [Disabled] [Auto]
